I and my family have lived and worked in the Hawkesbury all our lives. I now proudly represent the community on Hawkesbury Council and the Hawkesbury River County Council, as well as a range of other community groups.

Both my son and I attended Oakville Public School, and he now attends Arndell Anglican. I attended Windsor High.

I've taught in many local schools. I've lived in Oakville, North Richmond and McGraths Hill, and Richmond - where I own my house. I've run a successful local consultancy business for over twenty years.

I've always sought to serve our community, including through:

Standing for ideas

People know where I stand because I've consistently spent my public life presenting my views, advocating for worthy causes, and delivering real results for the Hawkesbury Community.

Here is my challenge: None of the other candidates, however worthy, can point to a body of work where they demonstrate their arguments on important issues. No long form writing. No debates or speeches. Not in print, or on video, or in any other medium.

What I stand for is out there in the public domain for you to see and to judge, and I am seeking your support to continue to fight this good fight.

I offer this brief extract of my writing as an example of what I stand for.

"What would a political leader look like who spoke unapologetically about Western Civilisation being objectively, measurably better that its alternatives? Who was able to demolish the intellectual impostures of cultural relativism and postmodernism, and who built and articulated an intelligent and publicly compelling case for the subsequent and necessary decisions on immigration, foreign policy and defence? A leader who, as John Howard says 'Can win arguments, not just elections.'

What would a leader look like who understood that we live in a society, not just an economy, and while admitting that free-markets consistently generate greater wealth, good regulation and accountability are necessary?

What would a leader look like who was prepared to address existential threats to civilisation such as overpopulation, climate change or resource depletion, but did so honestly? Who understood that our fundamental duty is to the generation after our own, more even than to our own? Who values science funding and education? Who acknowledges our Judeo-Christian heritage at the same time as respecting the necessity of separation between church and state? Who was welcome to be a practicing Christian, but refused to wear it on their sleeve or ram it down your throat?

Whose attention span is longer than a tweet?

Being an Australian Liberal should have everything to do with acknowledging the wisdom that our future comes from our past, and that there is value in a sense of continuity and connection with that.

My values

The Crown, the Constitution, and our inheritance from the Enlightenment are worth defending, because they have given us health, wealth and (relative) peace for over a century. That's something Australians should be prouder of than they are.

Being a Liberal should be about an absolute commitment to balancing our budgets and living within our means as the surest way of preserving intergenerational equity, but it shouldn't be about driving efficiency at any cost, because the electorate will spit you out.

Being a Liberal should be about preserving an absolute right to free speech and being confident enough in the force of our arguments to never seek to censor. Censorship robs us all of our right to see bad ideas fail in a fair fight in the public square.

Lastly, we should be about governing for everybody, because when the pie is bigger, everyone gets a bigger slice."
